"I entered medicine before the discipline of oncology was established. Patients with renal cancer were cared for by nephrologists, of gastrointestinal cancer by gastroenterologists. If a tumor was resectable, it would be removed by a general surgeon. Radiation Therapy (not yet oncology) would irradiate tumors that were not resectable or as adjuvant therapy if local spread was suspected. There was no CT, MRI or PET scan for staging. The development of the specialty of oncology was a transforming event."

"Following my service in Vietnam, I began my fellowship in medical oncology under Dr. Vaitkevicius who instilled the values of team science and translational science. Upon returning home and being a veteran, I asked each new patient if they had served in the military. In the first year I encountered two veterans with soft tissue masses that were diagnosed as complex soft tissue sarcomas. Like these soldiers we were all exposed to dioxin (Agent Orange). I reported those two cases to the Veterans Administration in 1973. Those foundational pillars taught to me led to significant advances of bone and soft tissue sarcomas. We engaged in the development of neoadjuvant cytotoxic chemotherapy."
